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1) Do you know this dress is? I'd like to buy it!
2) 'Err is the Empire State Building?' '1250 feet hig I think! '
3) Look at Bob! is he? He's 30 and I know that you're younger
4) I can notice this news is to you
5) I need some petrol, but is it from here to London?
6) Look at the cakes in the box, and tell me left I may need to buy more!
7) I'm at the swimming pool! Do you know it is?
8) Be sensible! Don't carry this case! Look it is!
9) I don't know it has been since I last saw you
10) I'm really suprised when I see he is for his age!
11) Of course I did! Every month did you visit him?
12) Really I can't forget some help!
Answer

1) Do you know how much this dress is? I'd like to buy it!

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In this sentence someone wants to know the price of a dress. The question is indirect, therefore, the construction will be: 'Interrogative word + Subject + verb'. This indirect question is introduced by 'do you know?', which is a direct question.

2) 'Err ...how high is the Empire State Building?' '1250 feet high, I think! '

This is a direct question to ask about the height of the Empire State Building. => 'How high is the ESB?'

3) Look at Bob! how old is he? He's 30 and I know that you're younger ...

This is a direct interrogative clause to ask Bob's age. => 'How old + verb + Bob =?'

4) I can notice how important this news is to you

This is a direct interrogative clause to ask about 'news'. Is it important or not? Please, notice that 'news' DEMANDS the verb in the singular. 'What's the news?' 'The news is important'.

5) I need some petrol, but how far is it from here to London?

This is a direct question to ask the distance there is between London and the place where the car has stopped. =>'How far is it ... ?'

6) Look at the cakes in the box, and tell me how <u>many</u> there are left ... I may need to buy more!

Here, we have an indirect question to ask information about the number of cakes (countables) there are left in the box. =>'... how many cakes there are ...'

7) I'm at the swimming pool! Do you know how wide it is?

This indirect question is inquiring about the width of the pool : 'Do you know how wide it is ...'. It's introduced by 'Do you know?', which is a direct question ...

8) Be sensible! Don't carry this case! Look how heavy it is!

To be sensible = to be reasonable; a case = a suitcase. I don't want you to carry this case because it's too heavy! 'Look how heavy it is ' = an exclamative clause!

9) I don't know how long it has been since I last saw you ...

This is an indirect question introduced by 'I don't know'. => 'Interrogative word + Subject + verb'

10) I'm really suprised when I see how tall he is for his age!

This is an indirect interrogative clause introduced by : 'I'm very surprised to see ...'

11) Of course I did! Every month ... how often did you visit him?

'How often ... ' = 'How frequently?' This interrogative clause is direct =>' How often + verb + subject + ? .'

12) Really ... I can't forget how kind you were when I needed some help!

This is an exclamative clause : How kind + subject + verb.
